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# Presidents Message


Welcome Everyone,


As always, I hope this newsletter finds you in good health. There's been frost on the pumpkin patch, so I guess winter is on its way.

## Message from our Secretary, Dave Muir

Not only does the Chapter provide support and education, but it also advocates for better care. Here's a summary of the activity.

In April 2016, the Board wrote a letter to the Niagara Health System (NHS) and Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) listing and describing the shortfalls in the ostomy care process, which include: patient pre-op ostomy education and stoma site marking, surgery, post-op education and recovery, patient discharge, and community home

care (delivered by Care Partners). Both organizations responded that they were working to improve their portions of the care process.

Later that year, Care Partners failed contract negotiations with their ostomy care nurses causing them to strike. The strike was prolonged creating a great deal of hardship for Niagara ostomy patients. During the strike, all of the nurses resigned or retired. The Chapter fielded many calls for help from ostomy patients.

Since then, Niagara community care has been marginal. Care Partners hired an NSWOC full time and one of the original nurses part time. They both lasted a year and resigned due to work load and scheduling problems. Care Partners then chose to create their own ostomy 'nurse specialists'. They hired four

Registered Practical Nurses and had them take a 10 week, on-line training course followed by several days of optional hands-on training. With successful completion of this course, they were considered sufficiently trained and immediately started providing ostomy patient care. The Chapter received more requests for help because patients were not satisfied with their quality of care.

Late in 2017, NHS Senior Management approved giving wound, ostomy and continence care equal priority and hiring additional staff. In early 2018, a



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new Director of Nursing Practice was hired and given the mandate to put a wound, ostomy and continence care team together. She, in turn hired, new nursing staff with the appropriate qualifications.

In 2018, just prior to the Ontario election, the Board again wrote another letter. This time it outlined the problems of community ostomy care to the 4 Niagara MPPs, a Local Health Integrated Network (LHIN) Vice President and an NHS Vice President and asked for their help. The only active response was from Jim Bradley. He spoke to the Minister of Health on Niagara's behalf but they both were not successful in their bid for reelection. So far, there are no improvements to Niagara ostomy care evident from this letter.

A recent communication with the NHS Director of Nursing Practices determined that The Wound, Ostomy and Continence Team focussed on pressure wound prevention in their first year. Now they are eager to start planning and performing changes to ostomy care. The Director offered to hold regular communications with the Niagara Ostomy Association to share our knowledge and services.

We will keep you informed of any progress.

Question: Is it normal for a stoma to change in length over time?

Response: No two stomas are exactly the same. But, all stomas do share similarities. They have the same basic shape — round or oval, and most stomas either protrude from the skin several centimetres, or are flush with the skin.

No matter what the shape, it is very important for you to consistently evaluate your stoma and the skin around it for signs of irritation, this will help you prevent future skin issues/breakdown.

After surgery it will take time for your stoma to reach its final size. You will notice that your stoma length changes when you move in certain ways. The little changes are normal for example, when you cough, it might go in as your stomach muscles tighten, it will then return to its regular length. A Stoma change like this is normal.

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

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

However, if your stoma is becoming longer and the length is impacting the fit of your pouch, it is important that you contact an Enterostomal Therapy Nurse (E.T. Nurse), for professional advice and support. You may be experiencing a prolapsed stoma. Enterostomal Therapy nursing specializes in wound, ostomy and continence care. An E.T. Nurse is a registered nurse with advanced specialized knowledge and clinical skills in wound, ostomy and continence care. E.T. Nurses work closely with ostomates and have the experience to assist them.


To find an E.T. Nurse in or near your location see the following instructions below:

#### What is a prolapsed stoma?

A prolapse of the stoma occurs when the bowel protrudes through the stomal opening in the skin to a greater extent than was anticipated. Although when this first happens it could be very distressing, it is usually not serious. However, it's important that it is reviewed by an E.T. Nurse. There are many causes for a prolapse to occur.

There are a number of ways of managing a prolapse and your E.T. Nurse will advise you on how you should look after the stoma, and give you help in reducing the swelling. She/He will also advise you on which specialist pouches are available, and the use of abdominal support garments.
