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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

I hope this newsletter finds everyone in good health.

With spring just around the corner, it reminds me of my ostomy surgery. On March 21, I will be celebrating 13 years with an ostomy. When I look back, being in hospital for 5 weeks prior to surgery, I never thought I would be here. Can we all say, Ostomy surgery is a life saver!

Once again, we have firmed up a date for Ostomy Visitor training, June 7th at the Lions hall in our regular meeting room from 9am sharp till about 3:30pm. The session will be based on the new revised guidelines for visitor training produced by Ostomy Canada. Certification will be valid for 5 years instead of the current 3 years. If our plan to

do pre-op visits in the hospital comes to fruition, we will need more visitors than we currently have, please really consider taking this training. Spouses, significant others and caregivers can attend. I will have signup sheets at the March meeting.

We will be presenting to 23 Grade 10 students' health class on March 13 at the Grimsby Secondary School. Not sure what the agenda is yet, as the class is only 70 minutes long. This is a first for presenting to high school; it will be interesting to see how it goes. I'm looking forward to it as always.

Friends of Ostomates Worldwide (Canada) FOW (C) is doing a sort & pack at the Lions Hall on April 26th. We could use a few helping hands. If you're free on that Sunday, please chat with me and get the details. FOW (c) receives unused, new ostomy supplies from across Canada, re-sorts &

packs and ships to third world countries where people cannot afford to buy them. This shipment will be sent to Paraguay and we're expecting 3 or 4 skids in total to be sent to them.

At the January meeting I mistakenly reported that garbage collection in St. Catharines was going to be only accepted in clear bags, I have learned that is not correct. I did call the Region of Niagara and got the facts from them. Starting in October, garbage will be collected every 2 weeks, and it does not have to be in clear bags. That was one option they looked at, but it was decided that it was not an acceptable condition. I was assured that the topic will not be discussed again anytime soon, if ever. I asked about ostomy supplies, and the fact they are considered medical, with feces bodily fluid residuals, and some



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


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people would not want to leave them for up to 2 weeks due to the nature of them. I was told there will be forms available on-line or at the Region headquarters to apply for an exemption, and have "medical only" garbage picked up weekly. The form would need to be signed by a Doctor, and approved by the Region. He was very clear that only medical waste can be put out on the off weeks, if you put regular garbage out on the off weeks, it will not be picked up, and you run the risk of losing the privilege.

I hope to see you at the March meeting.

DRUGS AND ESOPHAGITIS

Have you ever suffered agonizing chest pains after taking medication? Medical experts say that drug induced esophagitis can result when capsules and pills linger in the esophagus for lengthy periods if swallowed with small amounts of water. This is particularly true if the patient is lying down. According to experts, the solution to this problem is to drink a lot of water (a cup full), and remain standing for a few minutes after taking the pill. 'These suggestions are not always easy to follow," states Dr. Hans R Neuman of Wilton, Conn. in an article in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Dr. Neuman further states that a "simple method that is always useful for recumbent patients is to swallow a few bites of banana. It will melt and provide a smooth costing that adheres to a tablet or capsule."



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IS IT ALWAYS NECESSARY TO USE SEALANT ON MY SKIN?

Skin sealants such as Skin-Prep by Smith & Nephew, Skin Gel Wipes by Hollister, Allkare by ConvaTec and Bard Skincare Protective Film are available in different forms, such as small wipes, sprays or applicator bottles. These products contain a plastering agent as their main ingredient and are used to provide a thin protective film on the skin surface. This film helps prevent injury to the surface layer of the skin during appliance removal. It also acts as a moisture barrier. For people with dry skin, the film actually improves appliance adhesion. Skin sealants also contain variable amounts of isopropyl alcohol. Because of the alcohol content of the sealant, burning and sting-

ing often occur when the sealant is applied to damaged skin. Therefore, skin barrier powder should be used rather than a skin sealant on irritated skin. It is also important to know that skin sealants may not be recommended for use under certain skin barriers. The protective film may reduce the adherence of the barrier.

LIVING WITH AN OSTOMY WILL TAKE SOME ADJUSTMENT

In the first few weeks following surgery, you may find yourself feeling confused, angry, sad or frustrated. These are normal post-surgery feelings and should diminish as you adjust to life with a stoma.

Here are some guidelines that may help ease difficult feelings:

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<u>Be patient</u>: Don't be too hard on yourself. Some days will be better than others. In time, you will feel like yourself again.

<u>Keep talking</u>: Keep communication open with a loved ones and your ostomy nurse. You may find that discussing your feelings makes you feel better.

<u>Try to stay active and in good company</u>: With your doctor's permission, take up a new hobby or get involved with an activity group.

Express yourself creatively: Some people find that writing, painting, drawing or doing other craftwork can be energizing, offer an alternate outlet for difficult feelings, and help focus the mind.



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Be on the lookout for depression: Though it is normal to feel sad or "blue" for a week or two after surgery, these feelings should go away as you heal. If these feelings worsen, or you have any of the following symptoms, talk to your doctor or ostomy nurse right away. The sooner you seek help, the sooner you will start feeling better.

Symptoms of depression: Prolonged feelings of

What's required by you?

- Be well-adjusted to your ostomy for at least one year.
- Have a positive outlook on life, with good listening and communication skills



- Agree to be on the Visitors team of trained visitors and try to make yourself available when called upon by the visiting coordinator
- Agree to follow the guidelines of the Ostomy Canada Society's Visiting program

What you need to know.

- Dress comfortably, in clean, tidy clothes as if you were making an actual visit.
- Bring a lunch with you since there are no restaurants near the hall.
- Coffee, tea, refreshments & light snacks will be provided by Niagara Ostomy.
- An information package will be sent ahead of time to prepare you for the session.
- You will be required to participate in all aspects of the session, and there will be active roleplaying to familiarize you with visiting scenarios.

The session will start at 9 am sharp and run until about 3:30 pm to be held at:

Grantham Lions Club, 732 Niagara St., St. Catharines.



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

sadness, Grief, Hopelessness, Thoughts of suicide, Loss of appetite, Inability to sleep or sleeping too much, Feelings of isolation, Lack of interest in activities you normally enjoy

Other "feel better" ideas for your recovery:

Become a well-educated consumer: The more you know, the easier it is to make important decisions about your health. Your ostomy nurse is your first resource. You can also find useful information from ostomy support groups and associations. The me+ program is a great place to start.

Talk to other people living with an ostomy, as well as their loved ones: Other people successfully living with an ostomy can help you understand you're not alone in your recovery. They

may also offer helpful tips, or additional insight into what to expect as living with a stoma becomes normal for you. Consider joining a local or online support group. Your ostomy nurse or local ostomy association chapter can make suggestions and put you in touch www.ostomy.org.
